

TDC 'drains donations' for historic cottage

S omerset Cottage, a much-loved 165-year-old restored "mud house" at Mahana, Nelson, is threatened with new Tasman District Council rates demands.

The cottage, open to the public and on the Upper Moutere tourist trail, has been maintained by volunteers for nearly 40 years. Secretary of the non-profit Somerset Farm Settlers Cottage Trust Paul Bensemann said that when locals approached Waimea County Council in the 1980s, offering to restore and refurnish the house for the community, the council promised it would be rates-free.

"Local volunteers including committee members do the

upkeep but pay materials for such as timber, paint and woodstain from coins in an on-site honesty box," Paul said. "By far the most work has been done by cottage our stalwarts, Eileen and Graeme Thawley. The council wants to drain our income, which was \$127 the 2024 financial year."

Working bees planned for this summer were on

hold, he said, because the council was asking for \$133.69 for this rating year, more than the year's donations. The initial demand was \$1082.84, which would nearly bankrupt his committee, he said. The group had just \$1160 in its account.

"I'm upset by the rather bullying way they have done this, sending me a letter out-of-the-blue in July with a rates bill. They then imposed a penalty payment as part of a \$297.78 instalment in August. There was no consultation."

In July and September, the council sent forms for a "remission application" but the deadline was 31 May, two months prior to the first rates invoice and before he had heard of the rates plan, Paul said. "Council staff have since

dug their heels in and demanded \$133.69 for refuse/recycling, but we have no rubbish collection."

The building is Historic Places Trust-registered https://www.heritage.org.nz/list-details/5153/Listing and its history is described also on the Bensemann website https://sites.google.com/view/bensemannfamily/cottage

Onsite displays describe English and German settlement and the building's interior shows a typical settler family, with mannequins, period furniture and farm implements. The cottage is popular with school history classes, guided groups (especially bicycle tours) and

wedding parties.

Restoration, starting in 1980s, involved local farmers, small businesses professional thatcher Norbert Kleinschmidt, who had emigrated to Nelson from Germany. He toured the South Island to find the right kind of rushes and installed the thatch free of charge, replacing it twice. "We consulted the Historic **Places** other earth houses around New Zealand, collected old photos and records and interviewed elderly

people who had lived in the cottage," Paul said. "The project has been a wonderful example of community spirit."

Paul said the "aggressive" letters from council seeking rates had no-one's name on them and contradicted values listed on the TDC website, such as: "care and empathy are a priority"; "We are kind and nurturing"; and "We aim to be good ancestors for our people, resources and region and leave the world a better place."

Emergency Preparedness Plan

Launch November 29

he purpose of the Māpua-Ruby Bay Emergency Preparedness Plan is to:

- Support individuals and communities to take ownership of their own emergency preparedness.
- Help communities to understand their hazards and increase resilience.
- Promote problem solving and self-sufficiency through strong social networks and a culture of mutual help.
- Reduce reliance on first responder agencies during an emergency.

Enabling, empowering and supporting individuals and the community to take ownership of emergency preparedness is the goal of the Māpua-Ruby Bay Community Emergency Preparedness Plan (CEPP) to be

launched at the Māpua Hall on Saturday November 29.

"Our community experience the impacts of adverse events, weather fires earthquakes at some time in the future. Having a plan and working together will increase resilience," says Paul McIntosh chairman of the Māpua and District Community Association (MDCA) which has led the initiative to prepare an emergency plan.

The groups taking part in the Emergency Preparedness Day to launch the plan will include Civil Defence, Neighbourhood Support, FENZ, St John, Tasman District Council, Climate Resilience as well as community groups. The day will feature information, competitions, giveaways and a sausage sizzle.

The plan is the result of seven months of work by the Community Emergency Preparedness (CEP) subcommittee which has appointed Susie Wendelborn as CEP Team co-ordinator.

As part of its research, the committee conducted an on-line survey to assess the resources including skills and equipment available in the community, and how prepared residents felt they were to cope with an emergency. The survey also asked what risks people believed were most likely to impact their homes or businesses.

"We received around 80 responses to the survey and a number of those who responded, including many local businesses, indicated they were happy to support the plan in some capacity."

The strength of the plan is that it has been developed specifically for Māpua and Ruby Bay and is not "a command and control" plan but is instead about collective responsibility, says Paul who is also a member of the CEP team.

"The aim is to increase the resilience of our community to the impacts of hazards and to promote problem solving and self-sufficiency through strong social networks and a culture of mutual help," says Paul.

An example of how effective and successful a community initiative can be is the Appleby Hills emergency response programme founded and managed by Irene



Schrieber 10 years ago. That programme proved invaluable during the 2023 tornado, where organised efforts saw neighbours helping one another, damage quickly assessed, and everyone's safety ensured.

In the event of an emergency or disaster, it is unlikely the Nelson Tasman Emergency Management team, FENZ first responders or council staff will be able to reach everyone affected in Māpua & Ruby Bay in the early stages.

"The aim of the plan is to ensure that as a community we are resilient and prepared to take care of our families and neighbours during the initial 24 to 48 hours of a developing emergency.

"The successful adoption of CEPP will mean that in the aftermath of a natural disaster, our community will recover

more quickly and minimise the economic and social impacts on our residents and businesses," says Paul.

Clare Kininmonth, a member of the CEPP committee says she has been encouraged by the positive response from residents and businesses to the plan and also by the range of skills and facilities within the community which could be vital in a disaster.

The Māpua Hall Committee is working closely with the CEPP

committee, and it is proposed that the hall function as the Community Emergency Centre.

"MDCA is very appreciative of the support the hall committee has provided and looks forward to working together with the hall, local clubs, businesses and residents in the future to ensure our community is well prepared and empowered to respond to future emergency or disaster events," says Paul.

Would you stop in time?



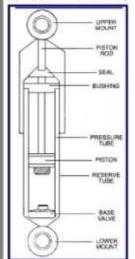
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Shock absorbers keep your vehicles wheels in constant contact with the road - without them your brakes and tyres simiply can not do their job.

At rest or in motion, the bottom surface of your tyres is the only part of your vehicle in contact with the road. When contact with the road is broken or reduced, safety is severely compromised. For example, tests have shown:

- Braking distance may be increased by 2.3m when driving at 55km/h.
- The maximum safe speed on dry roads should be reduced by 10% if shock absorbers are 50% worn ie. travelling at 90km/h instead of 100km/h.
- Skidding and aquaplaning can begin at a speed 10% lower on roads with 6mm of water and shock absorbers that are 50% worn.
- · Driver fatigue occurs 26% faster.
- Reaction time can be delayed by 26%.

A shock absorber is basically a pump located between the frame of the vehicle (via the upper mount) and the wheels



(via the lower mount). The Upper mount, piston rod and piston are all connected, with the piston surrounded by hydraulic fluid. As your wheel and suspension travels up and down, the lower mount moves, forcing hydraulic fluid through tiny holes inside the piston. These tiny holes only allow a small amount of fluid through the piston which slows its movement, in turn slowing the movement of the spring and suspension, therefore reducing wheel bounce.

Shock absorbers should be thoroughly tested on a mechanically induced rebound bounce tester (as shown) at least every 12 months. At Mapua Auto Centre this is done with every WOF

Protected Trees of Māpua, Part 2 of 3 by Lou Gallagher



People, places and personalities of Māpua.

Historic trees are an integral part of places immigrants first inhabited when arriving on these shores. Often the trees planted were reminiscent of their home countries. Trees were either brought in as seeds or as seedlings, surviving the perilous long journeys by sea.

Protected Trees of Māpua, Part 2 of 3 by Lou Gallagher

The history of protected trees in New Zealand stems from the loss of native forests during both Māori and European settlement, leading to legislation like the resource management act 1991 and local council plans that protect trees for their ecological, cultural and amenity value. Protection efforts range from national significance (e.g. Kauri, Totara, Pohutukawa, some of which face specific threats like Kauri dieback disease).

Some trees are protected due to their age or association with historic events. Others are protected because of their aesthetic contribution to the landscape, like non-native trees, Norfolk pines, Rhododendrons and various deciduous trees like the ones listed in the article below. Some councils, like the Tasman District Council, classify trees to ensure appropriate protection levels, e.g. category A for national significance and category B for local importance. On the NZ tree register for the Tasman region most protected trees are in Wakefield, Motueka and about four in Māpua. Scouting around Aranui Park a few days ago Lou and I were looking for a listed oak tree, to no avail, but it sure made me look more carefully at the very large trees in this park. Some stunning Redwoods there. Unsure who exactly planted these but will ask around.

More protected trees!

Three of Māpua's protected trees were planted in the late 1800s by orchardists who built a villa where the first Māpua school and post office overlooked the estuary (now Aranui Road).

Cuttings of the Ulmus glabra 'Camperdownii', a genetic mutant found by a keen Scottish gardener in the mid-1800s, were grafted onto Wych Elms, aka Scotch Elms, to produce the contorted shape of the highly prized Ulmus glabra. The orchardist who built the original villa on Aranui Road would have brought these trees to New Zealand over 100 years ago from UK with fruit trees for cultivation.

T613 and 614 survive to this day because of the meticulous care they have received from a succession of green-thumbed landowners over the last 140 years or so. These are designated by Tasman District Council as Category C, amenity value. *Photos previous page*.

The third tree, T615, is a spectacular specimen of Lord Roberts Rhododendron (see photos p4). As one of the oldest rhododendrons in this area, it forms a sweeping curtain of pink blooms and glossy green leaves around a central set of trunks. The magical space under this tree only occurs with very old trees. Its Protected Tree Status is Category B: Of local value.

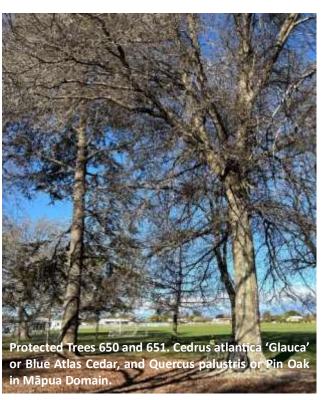
Author Margaret Jeffrery moved into the villa in 1912 and played under these trees as a toddler. Her father ran the orchard until he joined the 1st NZ Expeditionary Force in 1917. In 1918 when he returned to New Zealand the orchard had deteriorated and he took on work as a packer for other orchardists. Margaret and her Mum eventually moved to Nelson with her two sisters in 1922 where her aunt Emily Harris the famous botanical painter lived. Margaret wrote six novels. One was based on the Māpua area during her childhood here, called "The Forsaken Orchard" published in 1955.

Photos of the three trees at this property were taken with the permission of the homeowners who are keen to preserve their privacy. Sorry, but you can't see them in person!

Two of the Protected Trees of Māpua are easily accessible however; T650 and T651, a Blue Atlas Cedar and a Pin Oak, respectively. These are in the Māpua Domain (photo below, bicycle included for perspective) on the Bowling Club drive at 84 Aranui Road. These were assigned protected status based on their amenity value, Category C.

The Blue Atlas Cedar is native to the Atlas and Rif mountains of Morocco and Algeria where it is endangered due to human activity. This tree has been widely cultivated in the UK for ornamental purposes. The Māpua tree is likely to be an early cultivar brought to Māpua in the early 1900s, representing the original forest trees from Morocco and Algeria.

The Pin Oak is native to central and eastern US where it formed immense ecosystems. It tolerates poorly drained soils, originating from wetland areas.

've just returned from escorting another wonderful small group through Vietnam and Cambodia — and what an adventure it was! Every tour brings its own special magic, and this one was filled with laughter, connection, and so many unforgettable moments.

Our journey began in **Hanoi**, a city that never fails to charm. We explored the capital's winding streets by vintage army jeep, weaving past French-inspired architecture, ancient temples, and the famous **Train Street**, where we timed our visit perfectly to see the train rush by just metres away.

The evening street-eats tour by moped was a highlight — zipping through the narrow laneways, sampling sizzling delicacies hot off the grill, and ending with a creamy egg coffee overlooking the lake. By day, we wandered the Old Quarter, shopped for silk and art, and joined locals for early morning walks around **Hoan Kiem Lake**, iced coffees in hand.

From there, we headed north to **Ha Long Bay**, where we spent two luxurious nights aboard a traditional wooden junkboat. Sailing among limestone karsts and emerald waters felt like drifting through a dream. We swam, kayaked through hidden lagoons, visited floating villages, and enjoyed sunset cocktails on deck before dining under the stars.

Next was the serene countryside of **Ninh Binh**, often called "Ha Long Bay on land." Staying at a tranquil resort surrounded by rice paddies, we explored by **sampan boat**, gliding between towering cliffs and ancient caves. It was peaceful, authentic Vietnam at its best.

Then on to **Hoi An**, where our beachside resort provided the perfect base. This UNESCO-listed town is pure magic — lanterns glowing at night, tailors crafting made-to-measure pieces by day, and the scent of street food everywhere. We joined a cooking class, floated in basket boats through the coconut palms, took a lantern boat ride down the river, and ventured up to **Ba Na Hills** for that famous Golden Bridge in the clouds.

Finally, we crossed into **Cambodia**, where **Siem Reap** welcomed us with warmth and wonder. Exploring **Angkor Wat** and the "**Tomb Raider**" **temple of Ta Prohm** was breathtaking — the scale and history are hard to describe. We also joined a moped village tour, met the incredible hero rats that detect land mines, and explored the backstreets by tuk-tuk, discovering hidden markets and street-food gems. Our final nights were spent unwinding at a beautiful boutique resort, reflecting on all we'd seen and shared.

Another successful tour, filled with great company, delicious food, and countless special moments. Vietnam and Cambodia continue to capture hearts — and I can't wait to return in April with a new group!

Not only in organising the timed Thursday 5km run each week but also encouraging us to enter events and arranging trips away. There is no doubt that Debbi's enthusiasm and her encouraging and welcoming attitude have been a large part of the group's success. The group has become a great asset to the local community. It has benefited so many, not just in terms of health and fitness, but also socially as well, with lots of fun had and friendships created. Thank you, Debbi and Richard.

Well done to Sarah for taking over the reins. Sarah has been a key part of the group from its early days, and the group is well placed to continue and grow in a fun and supportive way under her very capable leadership.

Our walkers and runners have been enjoying the pleasant spring temperatures at our regular Thursday evening 5km events. These ideal running conditions contrast with the much less clement conditions our runners have experienced in some recent out of town events.

We had a group of runners take part in Merrell Race Tekapo where distance options ranged from 5km up to a 50km ultra event. We had runners take part in the 21km, 32km and 50km events. All the courses were trail running events over challenging terrain with significant elevation gain. The cold and windy weather added to the challenge, particularly for the 50km event which started before sunrise, when it was raining as well.

However, the conditions during the day were clear, which meant our runners were able to enjoy the spectacular lake and mountain views. Well done to

everyone who took on this challenging event. Special congratulations to Graeme who was placed first in his age category in the 50km event, to Christine who was second in her age category in the 50km and to Faye who was second in her age category in the 32km.

A group of our canine loving runners travelled to Christchurch for the 4Paws Marathon. This event also has a range of distances from 5km up to a full marathon. As the name suggests, the event is aimed at runners with dogs, although entry without a four-legged running buddy is also welcome. The event takes part in Bottle Lake Forest Park with a number of the courses involving a section along the beach as well. We had runners take part in the 21km and 32km events. The weather was cold, wet and windy unfortunately, although the forest did afford some protection. Despite the dismal conditions our runners all enjoyed the event which had a really nice vibe.

Next up was the Edridge Contracting Teetotal Traverse which takes place in the Teetotal Flats/Big Bush Conservation Area at St Arnaud. This is a challenging trail run with distance options of 8km, 13km and 21km. We had runners in the 8km and the 21km, and some of our runners helping out with marshalling and carrying emergency gear. By all accounts it was a really fun event, but also very wet and muddy. Well done to Mary who was first in her age category in the 8km and to Christine and Graeme who were first in their respective age categories in the 21km.

If you would like to join our regular Thursday 5km event, we meet each week in front of the playground by the Māpua Hall. We start at 5:15pm for walkers and runners who need more than 30 mins to complete 5km, and 5:30pm for everyone else. There is no need to register in advance and no fees to pay – just arrive a few minutes beforehand to sign in and to listen to the course briefing. Then join us for well-earned refreshments at the Māpua Sprig & Fern afterwards.

The President's Trophy takes place on several Saturday mornings throughout the season. Again, Māpua is represented with the first round taking place at Māpua on Saturday 11th October.

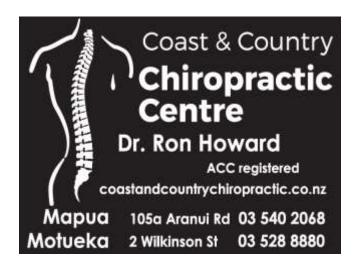

This month is Movember. The state of men's health needs urgent attention. Men experience worse longerterm health than women and die on average six years earlier. Prostate cancer rates will double in the next 15 years. Testicular cancer rates have already doubled in the last 50. Three quarters of suicides are men. Poor mental health worldwide leads to half a million men taking their own life every year. That's one every minute. The Movember Foundation is looking at ways that men think and act on their health, including:

- Understanding how traditional notions of masculinity can impact on men's mental health
- The way health services are provided to men
- New tests and treatments required to be developed to slow or stop disease progression
- Transforming health systems to place a stronger focus on outcomes that matter to men

It is also World Diabetes Day this month. Unfortunately, diabetes has become an epidemic related to

modern lifestyles and more than 257,000 New Zealanders now live with diabetes. Research from this year shows that a dietary pattern that minimizes animal-derived foods and emphasizes plant foods can reduce the risk of developing diabetes (*Diabetes Care* 2024;47(5):803–809), and the use of fish oil supplementation can reduce the likelihood of damage to blood vessels for those with type 2 diabetes (*J Clin Endocrinol Metab*. 2024 July).

Also, the chances of developing diabetes increase if you are overweight, not very active, and eat a lot of food high in sugar. A large systematic review and meta-analysis of using a low carbohydrate diet for type 2 diabetes showed over 30% remission of diabetes at 6 months (*BMJ*. 2021 Jan 13:372:m4743).

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Motoring with Fred

Holden's 4WD Commodore

Something I didn't know was that Holden had a 4WD Commodore wagon – or on today's terms, an AWD Commodore. Frank told me his story:

He saw it on Trade Me, looked mint, a nice Aussie-flag, blue and just had to have it from memories of owning 60s Holden Kingswood station wagons in his surfing days. And an AWD wouldn't have got stuck in the sand at those remote surf beaches!

sand traps to dislodge things, including your car. I have had a car upside down in a sand trap.

Plus, there is a cargo net that fits across the back seat so you can load the back to the max. Some good thinking by Holden to adapt their Commodore for outback.

There is also a small fridge set in a side panel run off the air conditioning - big enough for a few cold beers outback Aussies drink a lot of cold beer.



The car is a 2007 Holden "Adventra" LX6 station wagon (Adventra spelt wrong to match the Aussie slang). The car was meant to appeal to the Australian market for outback driving. Toyota was there also with a true 4x4 Prado, Ford with their Territory etc. so the Adventra was not a big enough seller; only produced from 2002 to 2007. It was also available with a 5.7litre V8.

Under the bonnet of Frank's wagon is the 255 Hp LY7 3.6 litre 60deg V6 engine. They say it's an Aussie motor, but I found reference to the LY7 engine being in Buicks, Cadillac CTS, Vauxhalls, and Opels, all GM products. I have found over the years that car manufacturers never make one of anything.

Frank says when he bought it, the last owner said it did 14litres/100km around town but better on a run. Frank said he got 10.4 litres/100km driving back from Christchurch to Māpua which I thought was good.

The body is a nice deep blue with its recent paint job by Spectrum Paint & Panel in Motueka. Wheel arch flares and short chrome strip on the bonnet, the only bit of bling added to the car but that is not what the car is about.

This is about endurance and as the name says, adventure on those dusty outback roads. Side roof racks with a ribbed cargo space on the roof with tie down points for extra luggage or camping gear.

This is matched inside the cargo space in the rear inside where there are again, adjustable tie down hooks to tie the luggage down on the long sandy roads where there are

On a drive out on to Ruby Bay: a nice smooth car to drive, no sharp bucking around on the roadworks going on at the moment. Quiet, comfortable soft grip on the steering wheel. I wasn't keen to have a go at the flappy paddles changing gear despite Frank's encouragement.

The dash is sports car-like with gauges included in the main Speedo, showing fuel and temperature but I was impressed to also see computer operated gauges showing fuel average used over the last 50km, along with mileage setting, time running, etc., now pretty well standard on most late model cars. I did like that the radio had adjustment knobs on it along with a seek button. So much easier to deal with.

Past Tasman, turning on to the by-pass, Frank said "floor it" and wow this car goes all right! Whipped up the first rise pulling 3000revs and finally dropping down to about 1800revs as we cruised home at 100kmph.

My thoughts: Getting in and out of the driver's seat requires a bit of effort. I had to pull myself up to the steering wheel then step out. Other 4WDs have higher seats and are very easy to step out of e.g. a Toyota Prado. Other than that, I couldn't fault it, AWD, useful luggage space, all the engine gauges you would need, comfortable, a station wagon for all occasions.

Frank's Holden is already becoming collectable. Parts being hard to get is a sure sign. A bit of motoring history for Australia and New Zealand.

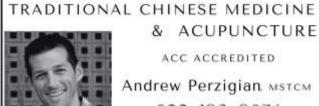

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Book Review

Davey Jones of Wakatahuri - by Davey Jones

This is a first, me reading non-fiction, let alone reviewing it! But I know Davey Jones, and I'm aware of the nomadic life he has led, cruising up to the Pacific Islands in the good ship 'Kelvin' more often than I have travelled as far as Christchurch.

But this book is not about that. It is about his former life. Ever since I moved to the Top of the South and got involved in the marine industry, Wakatahuri has been spoken about like some mythical place where boats go to die, up there with Narnia and Shangri La as some place

everyone knows about, but very few will visit.

The stories in this book will answer some of your questions and probably raise many more.

David Harrison Jones actually comes from Matariki, near Tadmore, so he is a local lad as well. After the family shifted to Picton, David's fascination with the sea grew until he began a boat-building apprenticeship which led to crewing on fishing boats, and from then on it was a seagoing life for him.

The book is largely centred around the Wells family, boatbuilders at Wakatahuri since 1906. But if you are related to the Wells, Orchard, Shroder, Dalton, McManaway, Hocquard, Jones or Harvey families, then you may find tales of your ancestors among the stories in this book.

At one time there was a Post Office and School at Wakatahuri, this was around 1906. The school did not last long, but the Post Office and telephone exchange were still operating when Davey Jones came ashore there for the first time.

When Davey Jones arrived in 1956, he was planning to make a living from fishing. This plan was soon modified. Among the sights that greeted him included three derelict small steel cargo ships, two at anchor, and one on the beach. This was an ongoing side-business, buying up old

ships and wrecking them to reuse the timber, fastenings and machinery.

When the WWII Fairmile launch 'Marlyn' was burnt on the beach in 1969, three tonnes of non-ferrous metal fastenings were recovered. Steel and other metals recovered were taken to Wellington to be sold. One of the highlights of this operation, Sounds Wrecking Co., was in 1957, when two derelict small coasters, 'Matangi' and 'Totara' were towed to Hong Kong by a tug for demolition.

The story of the Sounds Wrecking Co. is also supported

by the inclusion in the book of an article by Martin Berthold, previously published in NZ Marine News in 2009.

It rounds out the book nicely, along with the amount of information provided in both sections.

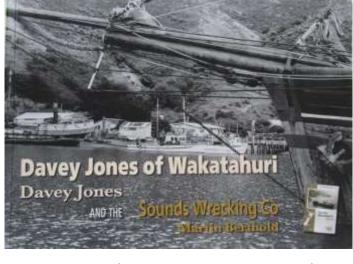
Along with the lists of every boat built and wrecked there are also the details of their dimensions, engines, and owners.

This provides good information for those who are into Maritime history, especially of our local area. Some of the fishing boats built and mentioned can still be seen tied up in Picton and Nelson.

The presentation of the book, from the stunning cover photo through to the comprehensive index shows the work of Carol Dawber, well known for her histories of various Golden Bay settlements. Carol's ability to find old and informative photographs and tell the story they illustrate has been invaluable in this book, which has the same interesting photo-led layout and easy to read text.

She and Davey Jones worked well together to produce this book, a valuable history, a tribute to those who chose to live and work in the isolation of the Outer Marlborough Sounds, and a good read! It is in our library.

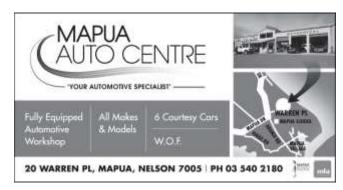
